

Final yr students get 5 days to write exam

Indore: Devi Ahilya Vishwavidyalaya has planned to put up the question paper in three slots for candidates in a gap of five days from August 26.

The varsity will upload the question papers for traditional undergraduate courses by August 26-27, followed by question papers for postgraduate courses by August 30 and then professional courses by September 4-5.

According to DAVV exam controller Dr Ashesh Tiwari, the gap of five days in uploading question papers will ensure that the number of candidates gets divided while submissions of answers

were sheets too.

Final year undergraduate students will get five days to write the examination and postgraduate candidates will get seven days to write the examination and thereafter they will have to submit the answersheets to their own colleges or the nearest lead college.

Undergraduate candidates have three exams remaining whereas the postgraduate candidates have to appear for around seven to eight papers. Around 150 colleges will be made collection centres by DAVV for final year students. In case if the student is unable to go, he/she

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will have to post it in the name of the principal of the lead college via speed post, added Tiwari.

Lead colleges will get a span of five days to submit the answer sheets to the evaluation centre.

In an online meeting conducted by Tiwari with the principals of the lead colleges, officials of DAVV and additional director of Directorate of Higher Education (DHE), Dr Suresh Silawat, it was also decided that the answer sheets will be evaluated and the result will be declared by the end of September or by first week of the month of October, said Silawat pointing towards the discussion during the meeting on Wednesday.

The final year students have been given an additional day to register themselves in the Students Information System (SIS). Now the candidate can register till August 21.

IET plans to start new session online

Indore: DAVV's Institute of Engineering and Technology (IET) has been planning to conduct the new academic session via online mode. The seats of IET are filled only on basis of merit list of Joint Entrance Exam (JEE).

Keeping the Pandemic in mind and for the safety of the students, the department has planned to begin online classes for the new academic session, IET director Dr Sanjeev Tokkar told TOI.

ats of bachelor of engineering (BE) and B.Tech. University Teaching Department (UTD) caters to six branches in engineering.

The counselling for regular candidates is to begin from September 10 for engineering candidates for full time courses.

"We will conduct the practicals via virtual lab. At the moment, the majority of the practicals can be done through virtual mode. Delay makes DAVV aspirants anxious

Indore: The delay caused by Devi Ahilya Vishwavidyalaya (DAVV) in putting up the details of the registration for courses under Common Entrance Test (CET) has been a cause of concern for the candidates who have been eagerly waiting to get admissions.

The varsity has been getting multiple queries from candidates wanting to opt for undergraduate and postgraduate courses under CET. However, they are asked to keep looking up the official website for the courses as DAVV will soon upload the details.

The delay in process will hamper the admission process which will hinder the academic session too which was scheduled to begin from October.

While the registration process for as many as 3164 seats for over 80 non-Common Entrance Test (non-CET) courses of the varsity had begun from July 14 and the last date for registration is August 31, despite getting approval to conduct admission process via merit basis, DAVV hasn't put up the guidelines let alone the dates for registrations.

For Indore's Rudra Singh who had secured comparatively less percentage in the board, the entire focus was on cracking CET. Now that the entrance test will not be conducted, he has be-

Guidelines for admission to be out soon

The guidelines for registrations of Devi Ahilya Vishwavidyalaya's (DAVV) courses that fall under Common Entrance Test (CET) will be put forth by the five-member committee for a nod on Thursday.

Despite getting a nod from the high court to conduct the admission process on merit basis on Monday, DAVV hasn't put up the advertisement yet. On the delay in uploading guidelines, DAVV vice-chancellor Dr Renu Jain said that as the committee has been set up to supervise the complete process, the guidelines and process will be discussed with the members. "After conducting a meeting with the committee members on Thursday, the guidelines for registrations will be put up within a couple of days and the registrations will begin soon," said Jain. TNN
